We recently had a prize that we were mailing to a member in Canada returned to us by the Post Office with a note saying that an "Export Customs Form" would be required along with a fee of \$11.00 to file that form. This was for a poker chip finger rest a small disk of wood about the size of a silver dollar and weighing less than an ounce! We have internationally mailed out many such prizes in the past without any problem so this is apparently a change in policy or a crack down by the Post Office and/or US Customs. We feel that this is a ridiculous situation but unfortunately it is something that we will apparently have to live with. *Consequently, we will no longer be able to mail out our sprint and challenge prizes to non-US hams*. We certainly apologize to our many Canadian and DX members and hope that you will be understanding of the situation. By the way, I can neither confirm nor deny the rumor that we managed to somehow get the prize to that Canadian member anyway!

NAQCC 14TH ANNIVERSARY!



Time does fly when you are having fun and it's hard to believe that we are now going to be celebrating the 14th anniversary of the North American QRP CW Club! Here is a rundown of the great activities that you can participate in.

Our party will run from 0000Z October 8 UTC (Sunday evening October 7th in North America) through 2400Z October 14 UTC (the following Sunday evening). 47 NAQCC members (see the list at the end of this article) are teaming up to put special event stations N1A, N2A, N3A, N4A, N5A, N6A, N7A, N8A, N9A, and N0A, on the air using QRP/CW from every call district in the United States. QSLs and certificates are available for working these stations and a very special certificate can be earned for sweeping all 10 call districts. There is no set schedule for N#A operations but they will all be spotted using our special webpage at http://www.naqcc.info/main_n3a.html.

On Tuesday evening of that week all 10 N#A calls will be participating in our special anniversary sprint (0030-0230Z, Oct 10 UTC) and that could be a good time to try and pick up that call district sweep. Every member who makes at least one sprint QSO and submits their log by the submission deadline will be automatically entered into a drawing where 10 great prizes will be given away. I won't reveal what the prizes are other than to say that for a club with no membership dues, the monetary value is significant. WHEN LIGHTNING STRIKES BY DAVE, N6XJP

This is not so much an article as it is a public service announcement. Dave is one of the N7A operators for our special anniversary event this month. A few weeks ago he sent me an email saying that he might not be able to operate in the celebration due to a lightning strike that fried most of his ham gear. In subsequent emails he told me the details and I am repeating them here as a warning reminder to all of us about the incredible power of Mother Nature. - Editor

From his initial email...

Paul....I'm in big trouble. We had a lightning strike a couple weeks ago.

It struck a 200 year old Saguaro cactus about 8 feet from the back of the house. The cactus was....was....about 25 feet tall. Blew the top 12 feet off. Off! And dissolved everything inside. It sits rotting now, smells real bad and is producing bugs. It also killed two 3 foot barrel cacti next to it. All this stuff is going to be removed by professionals next week...at a cost of about \$1200.00.

That's the good news.

The bad news is, among other things, it fried my PC (note that I am on my iPad), fried the front end of my TS 440, "rearranged" the firmware of my KX3, burned a 30 meter end Fed HF antenna, and scorched the ground around the top of my grounding rod.

This lightning was almost out of the blue. I don't operate, and unplug stuff during storms. This one surprised us! Loud? You cannot even imagine. I'd say around 140-150 decibels. Painful. Scared the crap out of us and the cats. We were just inside the wall next to the Saguaro. So, a million volts later, I'm dead in the water.

I have an old QRP rig I built years ago....(I think it's a YouKits or similar), rather rudimentary, and would have to operate on battery, fashion a new antenna (easy to do), and will only have 30 meters...10.105 - ~10.115ish. But I have no way to log other than paper and pencil.

So. I think it's best for you to find a replacement. If you absolutely need me, I'll give it a go, but may have to mail in the logs...assuming I can even contact anyone.

Whaddaya think?

From a followup email...

The Saguaro was estimated to be between 150-200 years old. It was about 30 feet high and had 21 arms. See the windows in the background...we were sitting right inside there. Loud? You have no idea! Im a retired fighter pilot... I understand noise. This was literally earth shaking. It was about 1700L, not dark at all, but the light was blinding. Although not a long period, just blinding. Hair up on

my arms, cats scrambled. I knew it was close, but not how close til I walked outside. There was smoke coming out of the top. By the way, the top 12 feet was on the ground, several arms were separated already. I have since had the arms and top removed. The rest will be "disassembled" and removed Tuesday the 18th.

So, one ham might ask, "how is your grounding system"? Ha. Unless it is unplugged from the wall, unless it is separated from the antennas, your equipment will be fried. An 8 foot ground rod? Ha. This is monsoon season in southern Arizona. The ground was near saturation. See the two barrel cacti on either side? They are both fried, and dying. They will have to go as well...they are rotting from within.

Oh. My antenna was (Was) an ended HF 65 foot wire hanging from the left corner of the patio...HOA notwithstanding....shhhh.



WOW! A LESSON FOR ALL OF US!

I'm pleased to report that Dave is hoping to at least do a little operating as N7A during our anniversary celebration - although with limited resources. If you hear him be sure to congratulate him on the fact that the Saguaro was a taller and juicer target for the lightning than that chimney on his house!

PORTABLE OPERATING TABLE BY DEJAN, SA3BOW

For simplicity and comfort I try to find a bench table waiting for me in the great outdoors. And there often are. Even in surprising places. I think they are placed and managed by radio loving gnomes because there are almost always in a nice spot with fine take off angles in at least one direction. The tables are seldom made to my measures. My knees does not fit under or they demand some acrobatic movements. So I bring an "app" made by my fabulous XYL. Here I present the 2.2 model.





How to:

Get some construction plywood. Any 5-layer will do. The cheaper the better. They are made from less dense wood and stiff enough without adding unnecessary weigh. Cut to size. My tables have evolved to be smaller and lighter. But it is easier to saw off than to saw on..... Test!

The two supporting beams where from start 2"x2". Way to sturdy. Now they are even tapered on one side. Find 2 wagon bolts and wing nuts and two washers.

I definitely advocate a rim. XYL left the corners open. Me likey! Rain, crumbs, cables...they all benefit from it. XYL made the rim by cutting ribs of the plywood and glued them with some fancy modern glue that need no clamping. One spread the glue and give the rim a good wacking with a rubber mallet. She used no screws. This table has been stored outdoors in cold Swedish winter without splitting. Add some cheap paint to fight rain and sausage dripping. Clamp with modern cheap single hand operated clamps.

I became very interested in electronics while in grade school, back when CB's were very popular. I couldn't afford a CB radio but I had a multimeter and a huge Tektronix oscilloscope to tinker with. I would hang out at Radio Shack, Olson Electronics and Howards Electronics in Chicago looking for components for that next circuit to fix or build. I used to love reading Radio Electronics and Popular Electronics magazines and would get many ideas from them.

I began working in electronics/radio in the 80's while serving in the US Navy, receiving an Electronics Technician rating with specialties in HF communications, then later mainframe computers. While serving in the Navy, my hobby interests turned to computers, starting with the Timex/Sinclair ZX81, then Commodore 64/128, and finally IBM machines. However, while onboard ship I picked up a Sangean ATS-803 and began shortwave listening.

I got started in ham radio 18 years ago, after earning a degree in Computer Information Systems and while working my 48+ hour full time job. I needed a new challenge to pass the time that was previously spent in class or studying. I worked the midnight shift, six days a week, so I would be up at 2:00AM on my day off, a perfect time for working with the radio.

I had to pass the 5WPM code test for the General, so I spent a few months listening to code tapes while driving to and from work. Then I picked up a Small Wonders Labs SW-40+ QRP transceiver kit as well as a Ten Tec Argosy and made a few contacts at 2W at a very slow speed. It was quite a thrill for me to make contacts using QRP and my simple wire antenna.

I took a break from ham radio when I decided to resume my studies in grad school for Computer Science. And then later again took another break, but recently had my interest reignited while chatting with a coworker. It is interesting to see how the ham radio hobby has evolved over time, and it is challenging to get back into the original digital mode of operation - CW.

I really enjoy building radio kits, antennas, keyers, etc. and getting them on the air. I have built the Small Wonders SW-40+ twice (sold the first), Pixie II, PSK-20 Warbler, a uBitx, a few antenna tuners, and accessories such as the K1EL K10 keyer and a Hi-Per-Mite active audio filter. I'm awaiting the arrival of a QCX-20 and QCX-40 for this coming fall/winter projects. Getting my CW up to a usable speed again has been a real challenge for me. It seemed that no matter what I did, I could not get my speed above 10WPM.

I was fortunate enough to get into a CWops class last April which really helped to keep me focused and motivated to move forward. My instructor, Jack, W8KR is very passionate about CW operating and his guidance has been so very helpful and appreciated. I have recently started on the CWops Level 2 journey in September with Mark, K5GQ and again feel fortunate to have another very dedicated and knowledgeable instructor.

After completing level 1 of the CW Academy, I started working some sprints. It has been quite a challenge making just a few contacts. I'm still working on finding an effective antenna that I can quickly and easily deploy in the field. I've tried a linked dipole, end-fed half wave and a Crappie Pole vertical.

I hope to improve my CW proficiency over the next few months and I'm looking forward to working you on the bands soon.



NAQCC WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA CHAPTER




