

Attention NAQCC members:

Each year, we celebrate the anniversary of the NAQCC with our own special event during October. This year will be our 19th anniversary, which will run from October 8 (UTC) through October 14th. During that time, our Members will use a N3A call to make contacts (2xQRP or otherwise). For example, if you volunteer to put out the call from the 1 region, you will use N3A/1. No special skills are needed - if you are one of our members, you already have what it takes. I'd like to have all the US districts covered including AK and HI, but we go with who we get. It's a great way to rack up some QRP states and maybe some DX as propagation gets better. You can operate on any band at any time during the anniversary week, as long as you are using five watts or less. You can operate as often or as little as you like. We have a spotting page so that others can see when you plan to be on the air.

During the Sprint that week, we can only have one N3A call on the air per region and it is first come, first served for the Sprint operators. For more details see the August or July newsletter. 19TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

19TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

Plans are underway for the week of October 8-14th when volunteers will be operating with our N3A call. We would like to get operators in all 10 call districts and KH6 and KL7. Right now, we have 18 ops signed up, representing districts 1-6 and 8-9. We also designate special ops who can put out the call during October's regular sprint, which is Wednesday October 11th , 0030-0230 UTC. We will take all comers for the anniversary but only one op can work from each district during the sprint. First come, first served!

Unlike the sprint, your operating schedule is totally flexible which means you can be on the air at any time during the week. Except during the sprint, all bands are in play including the WARC bands (30, 17 and 12 meters) and hunters can see who is on the air by checking out the database on our website, which lists spots and schedules for our N3A ops. It doesn't matter if you are an old hand or new to QRP CW. You don't need to send or receive at high speed; the exchanges are very simple. With improving propagation, you never know how far you will go with five watts (or less).

A FEW IMPORTANT POINTS:

- There is no capacity limit to the number of ops outside of the sprint, so if you think you might operate, let me know. Each year there are a few ops who sign up, but are unable to operate, but that is not a problem.
- Additional information will be provided about operating and logging well before the anniversary, so stay tuned.
- Combining the anniversary with Parks on the Air, Summits on the Air, etc. is allowed and encouraged.
- The anniversary is a great time to experiment with QRPp (one watt or less).
- Although the basic exchange is simple, there is no time limit and rag chewing is up to you.


NAQCC STATE QSO PARTY CHALLENGE BY DON VE3DQN

The two-month summer break in the SQP Challenge is almost over. There are 19 SQPs left in the season, and, if we count the month from one NAQCC Newsletter to the next, there are 6 in August, 6 in September, and 7 in October. Four of these—KS, TX, CA, and NY figure somewhere in the top ten according to the 2022 Challenge report (page 4 in *https:// stateqsoparty.com/wp-content/uploads/ 2023/01/2022CHALLENGEFINALRESULTS. pdf*) But keep in mind that for any SQP where you operate "in state" also provides opportunity to rack up the points.

How to participate

- Work the QSO Parties. Rules differ slightly by state, so check those. Work at least two stations in each QSO Party.
- Post a summary of your results for each QSO Party to the appropriate page on *https://www.3830scores.com* The links to the submittal forms are on the left side of the page in yellow.
- Under "club" choose "other" and then type in NAQCC. If enough people do that we can get added to the pulldown menu. If you're already committed to another club, don't worry about it. It won't affect our friendly competition, but it's nice to get NAQCC some visibility.
- Some QSO Parties lump CW together with digital or other modes. If that happens, send a note to QSO Party Challenge Manager Don VE3DQN at don@hekman.net and

let him know that you worked strictly CW, or if mixed, how many of your contacts were CW.

• Check the NAQCC Newsletter each month to see how everyone is doing.

Notes

- Individual QSO Parties will do their own official scoring based on uploaded Cabrillo logs. We're just looking at the summary you post to 3830scores.
- To participate, you must enter as a QRP station. You don't have to limit yourself to CW operation, but only those QSOs will count toward the NAQCC QSO Party Challenge.


HOMEBREW MAG-MOUNT FOR PORTABLE OPS

Earlier in the Spring, I went up to Brooksville, FL with Ron (N9EE) and his QRP group on a NAQCC Chapter outing that they were having at a park. I wanted to test an antenna that I had read about and built my version of it mounting it on a \$4 camera Flea Market tripod. The antenna is only a 1/8 wave at 20m and works close to the ground. It worked quite well with WSPR @ 200mW yielding over 385 hits in about 2 hrs.

It worked so well that I thought that I might be able to use it in Maine at the beach and while I could use the tripod, I thought that perhaps a mag mount would be more compact easier to use in the crowded parking lots that I usually work from. So, I needed a magnet, bracket and some time.





PARTS LIST

- Harbor Freight 3" magnet with the hook ground off
- 1-1/2 x 1/16 Alum Angle (my stock) (2) pcs cut 2-1/2" long
- 1/4-20 x 1/2" bolt, washer and nut
- Female/Female BNC (My stock)
- RT angle BNC Male/Female
- (2) sets 6-32/1/2 screws, nuts
- 8-32 x 3/4 screw, nut and wing nut for counterpoise, if needed.

TESTING

I assembled all of the parts, covered those that I didn't want painted with masking tape and made it a pretty black and tried out the new setup. After just 2 cycles of WSPR (10 minutes) I had 46 spots reporting me with the furthest 2344 miles (VE6JY).

Obviously, this is really a compromise antenna but when you find yourself in tight spaces or want a light load to carry up a summit you can deploy this guy and use your height or beach to make up for the shorter antenna.

After the WSPR test I put it to work on the Adventure Radio Society's annual Flight of the Bumblebees CW event with great results.



THIS MONTH'S LETTER CHALLENGE: BIG BEN


If you are touring London, your "to see list" will most likely have Big Ben near the top. It is located in the Elizabeth Tower of the Palace of Westminster. Construction of the clock was completed in 1859.

Big Ben, however, is the nickname of the Great Bell of the famous clock and not the clock itself. At 13.5 long tons, it is the biggest of the five tower bells and chimes on the hour. It was delivered to the tower on a wagon drawn by 16 horses and raised to its position in the 315 foot tower by hand, a 34 hour process.

The sound of the bell is world famous. It does not have the round, ringing tone of a normal bell because of a slot at its bottom that was cut at the location of a crack. The clock is hand wound three times a week in an hour and a half process.

All in all, I subjectively calculate that learning Morse code is 75% easier than learning a new language.




